



Jesus of Nazareth: The Greatest Quarterback of All Time

Yes! Who would have thought it back in Jesus' day that a humble son of a carpenter would be God's #1 draft pick! And, God's most important Hall of Faith Fame honoree!

Jesus was tasked with putting together a solid team who would set out to remake the world. Did he turn to the top Scribes, Pharisees, or Kings of the time? No, his team selections were men from ordinary backgrounds - fishermen, a tax collector, a couple of tradesmen, Judas Iscariot (who Jesus named treasurer) and of course, Jesus' brother, James (important to bring the family in on the game plan).

Jesus then started laying out the game plan to his team. They would do much of their work, not on the home field, but far afield on away trips. Jesus' basic game plan was to convert the hearts of Israel's people to do two basic things: Love God (the team owner) and Love your neighbors (even if they gave you a rough go against your game plan).

In many instances, Jesus' message went out throughout the land. Crowds gathered when they learned he and his team were in the area. They sat and listened intently.

They watched him treat everyone with gentle respect. They were awed by some of his miraculous plays. On one occasion, he laid out the whole life game plan from a Mount. There, he shared how everyone, no matter their position in life, could share in the success of God's plan for them. Sadly, they didn't always get it. This was true of the disciples. Jesus tried explaining some of the intricacies with game day parables. They had so many questions. But Jesus, as ever the skilled quarterback teacher, let them ponder his stories and lessons.

Over time, his disciple team became great receivers. They opened their minds, hearts and souls to Jesus. And although it is lost on some followers today, Jesus recruits some very faithful women. They played then and play now, key roles in the advance of the plan.

Just think from those days forward to our own times, Jesus game plan has brought millions to the most amazing team ever. Sure, there will be questions of the game plan, dropped passes, fumbles and penalties. But mostly, the word is spreading. We are a part of that first team's legacy. It will take serious effort. We will be met by opponents who try to change the rules, put up ferocious defense and try to bribe the refs.

So we live our lives trying daily to live by his two basic commands. We aren't always with it every hour. We can pray and ask for support and direction. We can do the most vital work of spreading the word and recruiting others.

Perhaps one day, we will hear him say, "Well done, good and faithful team mate." And there we will be, a member of the greatest team ever assembled under the loving guidance of the Most Famous Quarterback ever in God's great universe.

Luke 4:21-30

Prophet on the Edge

Jesus, the young Jesus, has just returned home and preaches his first sermon in his home synagogue. He reads scripture and says little. Yet, something he says makes the people in that synagogue that day so angry that they want to throw him off a cliff. What made those first century worship attenders so enraged that preacher-cide was on their mind?

What Jesus did was suggest that their God, the God of the Old Testament, often spoke to non-Israelites, like the Syrian Naaman and the widow of Zarepath. His listeners were not happy to think that God was God to others as well as themselves. Of course, this is not just a first century idea. We humans have often fashioned God into ourselves. We are heirs of a tradition that has historically claimed God as Western European. Imagine a God that speaks Spanish, or Urdu, or Quechua. That is God – still speaking and not necessarily in English. How do we, as congregations, open ourselves to a multilingual God? How do we deepen our relationship with that God of all people? One way is become an Immigrant Welcoming Congregation.

Just as churches became Open and Affirming and grew spiritually in their understanding of who God includes; welcoming those culturally different from us and listening to how God speaks to them in their traditions expands our understanding of God and of ourselves as human beings. It all begins in the Bible, a book that some have called the immigrants handbook because so many of its stories are about immigrants. Its stories teach about welcoming strangers and foreigners and how such relationships deepen people's connection with God.

Your church can do more than Bible study on this issue. Some churches reach out to immigrant communities and churches and plan programs to share food, and culture and ministries. Some congregations read books, take trips, watch videos and listen to the stories of immigrants in their communities. Getting to know this changing world and letting in those who are different is all part of God's plan for the world. A world made of many kinds of people from many nations. All of us are born a life created by the same God. All of us trying to make a Just World.

If you want to know more go to ucc.org and search for becoming an Immigrant Welcoming Congregation. It's time we all did this. God has called to open our hearts to the stranger. God has called us to welcome the foreigner in our midst. It's part of being the church. It's yet another way to show your love of neighbor.
