Today, is the 17th of February. Did you know that in Ancient Rome (8th Century BC to 480), that February 17th was last day of the Festival of Quirinalia? It was a festival to honor the Early Roman State God of War, Quirinus [kwlr'ihnəss]. Quirinus means "wielder of the spear". The festival occurred in the spring when the Roman Army would bring out their shields and weaponry that had been stored away over the winter. So, what would a wielder of spears in 8th Century BC have to do with Jesus who lived in the 4th Century BC – AD 33? Quite a bit actually! In AD 32-33, Jesus' ministry was throughout the Roman Province of Judea. Judea was under the authority of Roman Procurator-Prefect (military governor) Pontius Pilate, and the Imperial Roman Army which occupied Jerusalem. The Imperial Roman Army had specially trained Lancers lead by Centurions (professional officers). They kept the peace, protected all Roman citizens, and personally guarded Pontius Pilate. The Gospels of Matthew and Luke tell about a Centurion asking Jesus to heal a very ill servant...which Jesus does. All four Gospels state that a Centurion uses a lance (spear) to pierce Jesus' side to learn if Jesus is truly dead after crucifixion. As Jesus was wounded, so we are wounded daily by "spears" that jab us...words, actions, and deeds. Remember, through Jesus we are...<u>F</u>ree! <u>E</u>mpowered! <u>B</u>lessed! <u>R</u>edeemed! <u>U</u>nited! <u>A</u>live! <u>R</u>eleased! <u>Y-</u>clept [ih-kleapt] Called!

Bicentennial Tidbits

During WWII, Medina high school students maintained a large white billboard at the southwest corner of the Square showing the names of our active servicemen. Not listed was our own Gene Febus, as he was growing up in Illinois at the time. He enlisted in the Navy at age 17, even before graduating from High School. He served as a parachute rigger for Carrier Air Group 6 on the USS Handcock, an Essex class carrier, which narrowly survived a Kamikaze attack off Okinawa on 7 Apr 1945. Participating also in the earlier battle for Iwo Jima, the Handcock saw 72 days straight of being at general quarters. Gene was aboard one of the ships in Tokyo Bay for the signing of the Japanese surrender and was also in the first party to go ashore.

February 17, 2019 Sixth Sunday after Epiphany

Luke 6:17-26

Surprising Teaching

Nothing is ever the same after Jesus talk gets in your brain. When he preached on that hillside, as reported in Luke's gospel, and began with "Blessed are you who are poor" there must have been more than a few taking those words out into the Roman Empire. The church later spread those words, upending the way people thought the world worked. "Blessed are you who are hungry now, and who weep now, for everything will change." These words burned in the hearts of many in the ensuing centuries. These words that instigated change with an emphasis on the marginalized and the outcasts and those excluded from the great and powerful rooms where important decisions get made. These words grew from the bottom of society not from the top. Jesus knew that change happens from the bottom up, not from the top down.

If we are going to really call into being "A Just World for All" then we need to start preaching to the bottom from the bottom. Take racism, for example. Take it as an example of something woven into our world that creates suffering to benefit others. Jesus said blessed are those on the bottom not blessed those who oppress and stigmatize. The unraveling of the sin of racism begins in Jesus words getting inside our brains so that the world will never be the same.

A group of young people, ages 11-24, met this summer for a week in the basement of Bethany UCC in Seattle, Washington. They met there to learn and talk about dismantling racism for the sake of the world. For 17 years, this pop up social justice program has spread the word so that we, as a nation, might absolve our past by inoculating the present with visions of an aspirational nation. An aspirational vision that believes Jesus' words about hope.

Those words reorder our perceptions of the poor and move us from blaming poverty on individuals. It lifts our eyes to see the systemic forces that keep people on the bottom. Forces like lack of health care, poor education, stagnant wages, racism, segregation, lack of affordable housing and more. When Jesus says, "Blessed are those who are poor," believe him and let those words get inside your brain so they might change the world. What action can you take to fight for the powerless?
