

Hello Church! I hope everyone has had a nice summer in spite of the Covid-19 pandemic. Yes, Covid is very much still with us and will be for quite a while. With that said, last Sunday was August 30th. The Summer Special Music was called "Who Cares?". This song was composed by John W. Peterson in 1960. The words have a real pertinent message. The verses and chorus are as follows:

"Who cares when the days are dreary? Who cares when I'm tired and weary? Jesus my Lord and Savior cares. Who cares when I'm sad and lonely? Who cares when I've trouble only? Jesus my Lord and Savior cares. There's not a dearer friend to me...He'll lead me on till His Face I see. Who cares when my heart is aching? Who cares when it's nearly breaking? Jesus my Lord and Savior cares."

"Who cares when my friends forsake me? Who cares when the storms o'ertake me? Jesus my Lord and Savior cares. Who cares when my hopes all crumble? Who cares when I fall and stumble? Jesus my Lord and Savior cares. There's not a dearer friend to me...He'll lead me on till His Face I see. Who cares when I'm weak and ailing? Who cares when my strength is failing? Jesus my Lord and Savior cares."

How appropriate are these words for this day, this year...in light of the current happenings we are experiencing! When we are asking, "Is God out there? Who cares? Why should we care for others?" Take to heart the message during these troubled times. The answers are:

"YES, GOD IS HERE! JESUS CARES! WE CARE FOR OTHERS BECAUSE JESUS/GOD CARES FOR US, LOVES US 24/7/365 not just on special holy days!" In Christ there is no...east/west/north/south, race/creed/color, gender, or any other dividing issue <u>we choose</u> to have! THERE IS NOTHING THAT SEPARATES US, HIS PEOPLE...HIS CHILDREN...ALL ARE EQUAL IN GOD'S EYES.

So...GO...CARE...each day, each hour, each minute!

September 6, 2020 Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost

Exodus 12:1-14

Remember, Restore, Renew

On this day we recall the beginning of Passover. Passover is celebrated by our Jewish brothers and sisters as a reminder of freedom from slavery. Pressed into hard toil, the people of Israel banded together, and so were able to escape to a new and more equitable life. Although this is not the season of Passover, it is appropriate to read this scripture on the secular weekend of Labor Day, as we recall the hard work by labor unions to secure freedom for workers of all kinds.

In the United Church of Christ, we rejoice that "each worker - judge or janitor, salesclerk or scientist, mother or millionaire CEO - is equal in the sight of God. Each person's work, done with integrity, is a contribution to society and has value and dignity. But the world doesn't always see it this way.

Workers are dependent on their employer, but employers are much less dependent on any particular worker. This unequal power relationship can lead to problems in the workplace. A common way that workers have responded is to join a labor union. Unions are one of the very best ways for workers to bring greater justice to the workplace. The right of workers to form or join unions is so important and fundamental that it is an internationally-recognized human right." (https://www.ucc.org/justice_worker-justice_unions)

The right of people to gather together and speak out against workplace injustice is part of a long tradition in our faith story. As we recreate or relax on Labor Day Monday, it is also an opportunity to give thanks for the United Church of Christ's commitment to the principles of fairness and equity in the workplace. This Labor Day, take a moment to pray using these or other words.

Dear God, On this Labor Day, we pause to thank you for the opportunity for satisfying work, and for the pleasure of rest from our labors. Be with all those, we pray, who work under unjust conditions. Be with all who advocate for those who work in such conditions. And be with us, we pray, as we strive along with you for a world in which every person is afforded decency, justice and fair treatment. In your name, Amen.
