

I stopped for a red light on the square just outside the front door of the church. I had the window slightly ajar in the cruiser as I always do, despite the temperature, so I can hear noises outside the car. While waiting at the light I witnessed a gentleman walk from his parked car on the square in front of the Court House toward the church. As he was crossing Liberty Street where I was waiting for the traffic light he walked out of the walkway and approached the cruiser. My initial and somewhat jaded thought was "what does he want to complain about on Christmas Eve?" So imagine my surprise and utter self shame when he said "Merry Christmas" and passed on a very special thank you for being out working that evening and keeping the community safe and he understood and appreciated the sacrifice I was making being away from my family on Christmas Eve. As quickly as he approached the car he walked away and disappeared inside the church. To this day I don't know who it was and if he is still a member of our church or not. If he is and reads this it was that simple act that made working the rest of that night both humbling and enjoyable. That's one crowded boat! Exactly 400 years ago today our Church Ancestors were more than halfway through their 66-day Atlantic crossing. By this time in the voyage two people had died, one baby was born, and one man was tossed overboard (and miraculously survived). They were intending on bringing two ships, but the Speedwell ended up not being seaworthy. This delayed their departure, and they crossed the ocean at the height of storm season. The seas were rough, and the rain was almost constant. Sickness prevailed and most passengers never went above board. Their living space on the Mayflower was about 58' x 24' for 102 people. I can't help but imagine at least some of the conversation talked about Noah's journey and the similarities between the two voyages (bad weather, cramped quarters, the smell). I'm sure at least one disgruntled passenger pointed out that Noah only had to stay on his boat 40 days... I'm also sure that they discussed God's promise to Noah and were looking forward to a similar promise when they reached their new world. They had a dream for their congregation, their community, and their individual lives – just as we have similar dreams. Governor Bradford wrote of their landing: "Being thus arrived in a good harbor and brought safe to land, they fell upon their knees and blessed the God of heaven, who had brought them over the vast and furious ocean, and delivered them from all the perils and miseries thereof." We aren't traveling a vast and furious ocean, but we are navigating perils. Like the Pilgrims, we should also be thankful to God – for getting us to the point we are at and traveling with us on our future journey.
