

GENERATION TO GENERATION

EPIPHANY WORSHIP SERIES

Embark on a transformative journey through the pages of the Gospel of Matthew as we delve into the rich tapestry of Jesus Christ's genealogy in the worship series titled "Generation to Generation." This compelling exploration invites believers to uncover the profound significance of Jesus' ancestry, tracing His roots through generations and revealing the divine purpose woven into the fabric of human history.

Sunday, January 7: "Roots Revealed"

In the opening week, we will lay the foundation for our series by exploring the concept of genealogy and its cultural importance in biblical times. By closely examining the beginning of Matthew's Gospel, we'll discover the surprising characters and stories that make up Jesus' family tree. In this reflective week, we'll turn our attention to the story of David and Jonathon. Explore the mystery and significance of their relationship, and consider how many kinds of loving relationships contribute to the broader tapestry of God's story and Jesus' family tree. 
Sunday, February 4: "In the Shadows of the Past"


GENERATION TO GENERATION

LENTEN WORSHIP SERIES




LENTEN BIBLE STUDY



Jesus was a skilled storyteller and perceptive teacher who used parables from everyday life to effectively convey his message and meaning. Life in first-century Palestine was very different from our world today.

In this wise and entertaining series, Amy-Jill Levine offers a fresh, timely reinterpretation of Jesus' narratives. She analyzes these "problems with parables," taking readers back in time to understand how their original Jewish audience understood them. Levine reveals the parables' connections to first-century economic and agricultural life, social customs and morality, Jewish scriptures and Roman culture. With this revitalized understanding, she interprets these moving stories for the contemporary reader, showing how the parables are not just about Jesus, but are also about us—and when read rightly, still challenge and provoke us 2,000 years later.

Amy-Jill Levine is Rabbi Stanley M. Kessler Distinguished Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Hartford International University for Religion and Peace. She is committed to eliminating antisemitic, sexist, and homophobic theologies.

"What a world, what a world!" cried the Wicked Witch of the West as she melted at the end of the Wizard of Oz. So often we melt in the same despair and frustration as we navigate the world in which we find ourselves. How do we avoid a meltdown and live joyful, peaceful lives in the firestorm of wars, violence, rapidly changing technology and everyday worries and frustrations?

This series explores how we can pull back and focus on our inner life, and learn that the present moment is the gift of truly living. Selected topics in the series will highlight some of the most common reasons that become stumbling blocks to living in the moment and cause us to miss the miracles God sends our way.

Using scriptures, stories, poetry, music and art, each week will guide us onto a path that points the way to becoming more aware of the blessings and miracles that are given to us, if we only become aware of them.

Sunday, April 7: The Miracle of the Moment brings us the awareness that spending too much time in the past or future steals our life at that moment. "Do not look back and grieve over the past, for it is gone; and do not be troubled about the future, for it has yet to come. Live in the present, and make it so beautiful that it will be worth remembering." —Ida Scott Taylor

Sunday, April 14: The Miracle of Forgiveness reminds us that not forgiving yourself and others for past mistakes and hurts keeps us in a cycle of depression and anger. Don't miss what you have because you miss what you lost—focus on current blessings; life is always flowing, and God is moving and creating new things.

Sunday, April 21: The Miracle of Trust focuses on learning to trust the promises of God. Trusting God with all your heart releases you from fear knowing you are protected, loved and always in God's hands on this journey of life.

Sunday, April 28: The Miracle of God's Presence explores how God wants us to experience His goodness everyday. Life is not divided into different categories where we believe and behave one way on the weekdays, and another on Sunday. Everything is spiritual, and God walks with us. When we realize this truth, it transforms us to not only accept the miracles in our lives, but to become a miracle for someone else.

Confirmation Sunday, May 5: The Miracle of Gratitude encourages us to develop a heart that appreciates everything it is given; remember and recognize your blessings. By expressions of gratitude and encouragement to ourselves and others, we build our inner spirit to stay aware of the good things we have rather than dwelling on the negative.

Sunday, May 12: The Miracle of Hope can sometimes be lost under the burdens of today. Letting go of disappointments in life, especially when life doesn't turn out the way we expected, can be very difficult. Keep hope alive by speaking blessings and staying positive. Your words have power, so make sure you are speaking strength and hope daily. Remember, every trouble has an expiration date.

Pentecost Sunday, May 19: The Miracle of the Holy Spirit is given to us to guide us on our journey of emotional and spiritual evolution. Learn to live life from the inside out rather than the outer world impacting your soul. God's wisdom and power within you is greater than any circumstance in your life. There will be one service at 10:30 for our annual meeting.


